

OVERVIEW OF THE RESEARCH

Rural communities are adapting to shifts in demographics, labour forces, and turbulent economic circumstances. Partnered with the COVID-19 pandemic, local governments have adapted to the shifts by re-evaluating plans and curating sustainable strategies to combat the unprecedented challenges.

The research examines the actors and processes in the Town of New Tecumseth as a case study to provide insight on the realities facing a community with strong rural heritage on the edge of the growing Greater Toronto Area (GTA). The research addresses the three questions:

- 1. What activities attract economic development opportunities?
- 2. What is the role of local actors in facilitating economic development?
- 3. What are the influences of COVID-19 on rural economic development?

The data collection occurred over the winter of 2025 and translated in a SWOT analysis to summarize findings.

- Leverage geographic location in proximity to GTA, developing tourism base connecting GTA to New Tecumseth and providing housing options to those interested in rural-urban lifestyle.
